Is AV Archiving a profession? - 1995

'What all audiovisual archivists have in common is that we learned AV archiving on the job. There was no other way. There still isn't' (Edmondson 1995).



Is AV Archiving a profession yet? - 2018

'It is probably true by now that no one who really wants to gain training in the field is without some options. [...] Nevertheless, the lack of a mechanism for formally accrediting individual professionals through CCAAA or its member associations remains an unresolved issue.' (Edmondson 2018)

The challenges

- The digital utopia vs the analogue reality.
- All tape-based formats created in the 20th century are now obsolete. Tape that is not digitised by 2025, we risk losing forever. This creates a deadline, and a dilemma, for those entrusted with the care of these precious memories. (NFSA 2015)



The role of education

A new generation of "emerging archivists," notably but not exclusively trained in new professional moving image archival training programs, is infusing the field with **new perspectives** and is often **unafraid to look to the periphery** for ideas. (Prelinger 2007)



What makes a qualification 'professional'?

When considering education and training for occupations which have traditionally delivered the skills and knowledge via a 'apprenticeship' or 'on the job' training it is important to:

- Consider what is hoped to be achieved through professional level education,
- Define educational aspirations for such qualifications, and
- Identify professional and industry expectations of the required outcomes from such qualifications.

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Case study: CSU GCAVA



CSU Graduate Certificate - History



- Started in early 1990s in partnership with the University of NSW
- Response to workshop-based training series run by the NFSA in South East Asia and the Pacific
- Delivered by distance since it began initially print & CD learning material, now all online
- Transferred to CSU in 2001 after the closure of the UNSW LIS course
- Unique teaching model of academic staff and NFSA tutors

 ensure practical experience in the teaching model
 alongside academics.



CSU Graduate Certificate - current

- A unique, formal university level qualification for those working in this sector of the archival industry
- Developed in collaboration with the National Film and Sound Archive (NFSA) under a contractual agreement.
 NFSA owns the IP for 3 of the subjects
- All subjects in the GCAVA are offered concurrently as electives in the Bachelor of Information Studies and Master of Information Studies
- Delivered online through Blackboard LMS





AQF Level 8
